That is all that they are allowed to do for you. Carry the form not, choose who you want to vote for.

Twenty-five years old: "Dad knows about it, but then he should because he has been around so long".

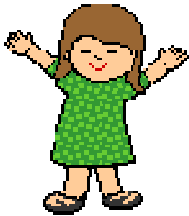
Thirty years old: "Maybe we should ask Dad what he thinks. After all, he's had a lot of experience."

The World's Best Kept Secret

In the spring of 1939, King George VI and his wife, Queen Elizabeth (who later became the Queen Mother) sailed from England to pay a

royal visit to Canada and the U.S.A. A warship sailed alongside as protection, because the threat of war between England and Germany was quite serious. Half way across the Atlantic, the King ordered the warship back to England as he felt it would be needed, if indeed the war began. He also knew that on his vessel was part of England's gold. It was to be harboured safely in Canada or the U.S.A.

As soon as Winston Churchill came into power as "War Lord", without permission, or even mentioning his intentions, he set about the transfer of England's entire wealth in gold, gilt edge securities, over to Canada. The first ship was brought down from Scotland and the crew were informed that they were to go south on a special mission, so the were "kilted" out with tropical uniforms. Golden sovereigns, guineas and bullion were stacked into wooden boxes. And stored on board. Although the sailors knew what was going on, not a word was ever uttered about the cargo and no receipts were signed. They had no idea of their destination or knew that Churchill was determined that if England were invaded, their gold would not be there.

The ship set sail for Halifax and on the way, encountered the worst storms experienced for some time and none of the crew had warm clothing. They arrived late in Halifax, battered, worn out, frostbite on some hands but the cargo was safe. The gold was then loaded onto a train and set off for Montreal. In the meantime, a quiet unassuming man in a London Bank was taken from his desk and put on a ship bound for Montreal. He was assured everything he needed would be given him, and his wife and family would join him. The man's mission was to open the Bank of England in Montreal, and he was to be in charge.

The destination for the gold was the Sun Life Building in Montreal and the bank itself would be in the basement. From there, business would proceed exactly as if in London.

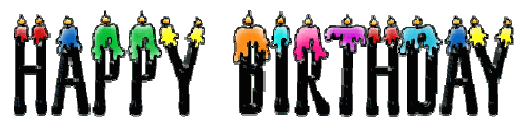
More ships followed with gold. Special steel doors had to be installed in the basement and checking in and out was a very important part of daily routine.

Churchill finally had England's entire wealth in the custody of Canada, even to gilt-edge securities, which are negotiable worldwide, without signatures.

Toronto has, at present, 9 (nine) copies of a book called "**Operation Fish**" by Alfred Draper. The information is thrilling and accurate and reveals how other countries like Norway and Holland were determined that Hitler would not get their gold, should they be invaded.

I was in the Sun Life Building several years ago, fully expecting to find some legend for all to read somewhere inside, but sadly there is nothing to let Canadians know what a big part this country played in World War I. My own opinion is that the story is part of Canada's history and should be part of the History course in every school.

It is impossible to reduce the facts to a small space and Martha has lots of other contributions to type. I suggest you read the book.

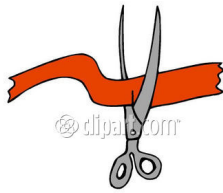
