#### **Looking for Your Suggestions!**

What's missing from the roster of committees and the events currently being held at 40 Homewood? We are looking for ideas from you, what events you might envision that could be held in the building. The Social Committee met recently to set their schedule of events for the year 2020. The list drawn up included the traditional events: the Volunteer Appreciation Evening (February 22), the Yard Sale, the BBQ, the Fall Art and Crafts Exhibition and the Christmas Dinner. The Committee also sponsors the exercise classes currently being held in the building on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 am in the Party Room and the popular monthly Brushes and Cocktails evenings. But what else can we do was the question hanging over us. New ideas included:

Board Games Night – to be held in the lobby level meeting room – a monthly event with starting date not decided yet (here is where we need to know who is interested and who has board games)

Movie Night – to be held March 28<sup>th</sup> – featuring Bohemian Rhapsody (no ticket required)

Casino Night (tentative while we work out the costs) – to be held in April (ticketed event)



Please follow this link to reserve a parking pass online. **https://www.buildinglink.com/V2/Tenant/Home/DefaultNew.aspx**

# Questions & Answers • to and from • the Board & Management

Q: Can I play music at my party in the party room when I rent it? A: Yes, music can be played through either the PA sytem (two speakers on the wall near the pool) or the surround sound system in this room. You'll need the proper cable to connect from whatever music player you are using (phone, android, CD player etc.) to the inputs in the two systems.

There is a cable (donated by someone) to connect an iPhone to the sound system in the room. If connecting

from a cd player you'll need something different. The plug you use can be connected to the system by the inputs on the front of the tuner and selecting video aux 35mm female pin plug or rca plugs on front of the audio system and choose input V-AUX.

Alternatively, the input to the PA system is a ¼" male plug so whatever plug you have for output from your device will need to connect to this input plug. When renting the room please ask security to be shown the audio cabinet so you know how to connect to the sound system for your event.

### Q: What happens when I sign up to receive notices electronically? A: When you fill out the

form to receive notices electronically you'll receive an email from the BuildingLink system as soon as the office sets up your account in the system. This will include an account name and temporary password. The email will have a link that you can click to take you to BuildingLink where you will be prompted to change your password and complete your profile. If you have filled out a form to receive notices electronically and have not seen a Building Link email please check your junk email folder as the BuildingLink email may be in there.

BuildingLink has a number of screens where you can reserve the elevator, party room or hobby room. You can also pay for guest parking on-line through BuildingLink now. New features will be added in 2020 to make living here more enjoyable for all. Building Link will occasionally send out email notices of things happening in the building that you may be interested to know about such as water shut-downs or new documents loaded into the BuildingLink library. We hope this system helps

you enjoy your experience here at 40 Homewood.

You can even download the BuildingLink app to your phone where most activities can be accomplished there as well. We are exploring why we cannot reserve guest parking there and hope to have a resolution for this soon.

At present, guest parking can be paid for through the on-line desktop system or by going to your browser on your phone and logging in through buildinglink.com. In 2020 we are still keeping 40homewood.org public for outsiders who would like to know about our building. This site also contains some important documents that we will start moving to BuildingLink this year. Updates

on this website may be less timely than on BuildingLink which is for residents and owners only.

### OFFICE REMINDERS

Do not leave garbage in garbage rooms, library or garage.

The key audit is underway please make sure the office has keys to your unit.

Q: The 2020 budget has a new guest parking rate — what is it and how do I pay for this? A: Overnight guest parking is now \$15 when paying by cash paid to Building Security. Security staff will provide you a receipt and a parking pass to put in the window of your guest's vehicle. To save you a little money we are offering a slightly lower rate to book online through

Building Link (not yet available on the Building Link app). On the website (or if you log-in to Buildinglink. com on your phone's browser) you'll be able to pay \$13 by credit card through the on-line service within Building Link. It is a two-step process for registering your car with dates and then going to the payment section on Building Link to pay. The Building Link method will also add some service fees on top of the \$13 rate but the total will result in more than \$1 per night saving compared to cash payments to Building Security. On the notes section of the on-line payment option please include your car license and make/model.

We encourage using BuildingLink for your guest vehicle parking pass. Passes must be purchased before 1a.m. to avoid a City of Toronto parking ticket (YCC75 receives none of the parking ticket revenue). The board has also approved a \$5 per month increase to all resident motor vehicle parking rates starting January 1, 2020.

Q: We heard that we are responsible for our entry

door closer that must close and latch the door as a fire safety feature. Some of us also received notices of our storage lockers having fire hazards due to hanging items from the sprinkler pipes. Please update us about these. A: Door closers close your entry door automatically and must operate to close and latch your door without any assistance. Late last year when Toronto Fire Service (TFS) inspected 10% of our units (50 units) they found some deficiencies in the units including door closers. Those units found to have defective closers or no closers have been notified and will be re-inspected by TFS. Even if your unit was not inspected or you were not notified of a defective closer

every unit should ensure that their closer is operating properly. Other units will be inspected by TFS in 2020. Building staff are available to assist you to reset the closer speed and strength should you need this assistance. If you do not have a door closer you must get one at your expense as each unit was supplied a closer by the building a number of years ago; the office can help you connect with a supplier to get one installed if yours is missing. TFS can issue fines for doors without closers or that don't operate properly. Items in your storage locker

must not impede the effectiveness of the sprinkler system. We ask all residents to inspect their lockers to ensure nothing is stored at a height above sprinkler pipes. As well, we ask you to remove anything hanging on the sprinkler pipes. Some residents have received notices to make corrections before re-inspection by TFS.

Q: Can you update us on how we contact our cable tv supplier when we have service outages?

A: Stubbs recently changed the service centre call number we should use. It is 1-855-874-6957; they are open Monday to Friday from 8am to 8pm. They will ask you to advise the building name which is York Condo 75. Letting them know as soon as an outage is observed helps get the service back as quickly as possible. Stubbs' goal is to rectify any outage within 48 business hours of the call.

#### Q: Have we changed the access hours for the

storage locker rooms?

A: Storage locker hours are 7am to 11pm and were recently changed in response to a resident request.

Q: Who do we call if we find pests (bedbugs or cockroaches) in our units? A: If you find any pests or rodents in your unit do not hesitate to contact building management, who have reliable pest control services to take care of these issues. The sooner the notice is made, the faster the resolution.

Q: Why do we have to use licensed plumbers when we have some plumbing done in ourunits? A: Recently a resident tried to fix a leak in their unit

without knowing how to turn off the water shut off valves. Their unit and a number of units below them were flooded and emergency plumbing services had to be called in and water had to be shut down on the whole water service line. All units on that line had no water for the whole night and following morning. Additionally, we require licensed plumber to present their licenses and wsib credentials to the office staff to ensure licensed plumbers are used when repairing or renovating units.

### good eats, sweet spots by Dr. Cammy Lee-Bostwick

happy new year everyone!

We are officially into the 20s – a new decade! And so, with "new beginnings", we venture out of our neighbourhood. I take you to Lee Chen, on King Street West just past University Avenue, across from Roy Thompson Hall. This is a restaurant that is about 10 steps below ground level so bear this in mind, if accessibility is an issue.

We ordered an assortment of Dim Sum, tapas-style small dishes: Shrimp Dumplings, Siu Mai (pork and shrimp dumplings), as well as vegetable fried rice, sautéed broccoli, and shrimp chow mein. The dumplings came stuffed full of shrimp and I detected a bit of bamboo shoot. Super tasty with just a hint of sesame oil. Vegetable fried rice was colourful with shaved broccoli, onions, carrots, fried egg, cabbage, and scallions. Lightly seasoned with soy sauce, it is the perfect base for any dish. And also gets my vote

for the best dish we ordered. The broccoli however was too heavy on the garlic. Shrimp chow mein was not the crispy noodles as I expected but came with soft noodles like a lo mein. With a blend of baby shanghai bok choy, shiitake mushrooms, onions, fried egg, bean sprouts, julienned carrots, and plentiful shrimp, it was mild in flavour yet very satisfying.

Service was efficient and quick. Pricing is mid-range. Although the restaurant is quite large, it somehow has a cozy vibe. Lee Chen is the kind of place where you can linger, not like the more "fast" restaurants that Chinatown is famous for. In fact, the extensive wine list and drink menu seem to encourage you to stay for a while.

Would I go out of my way to Lee Chen? No. But if you've got theatre/show tickets or work nearby and are looking for a new leisurely place to nosh and chat, then this might be the place.
